

What is a Brachycephalic dog?

"Brachy" means shortened, and "cephalic" refers to the head. Brachycephalic breeds have shorter skull bones, which affects their head structure. Because of this, they are at a higher risk for complications with anesthesia, including breathing issues and a greater chance of regurgitation.



PRE-VISIT MEDICATIONS



DAY-OFF CHECKLIST

Medications are selected on a patient-to-patient basis; your pet may be receiving some or all of the following medications:

- Cerenia reduces the risk of vomiting and decreases inflammation
- Reglan helps stimulate stomach and small intestinal contraction to reduce the risk of regurgitation
- Gabapentin acts as a mild sedative and pain reliever to help quiet your pet, allowing us to use less injectable sedation during their procedure
- Trazodone acts as a mild sedative to help quiet your pet, allowing us to use less injectable sedation during their procedure

- Withhold food the morning of the procedure. If your pet takes daily medications, check with your veterinarian for administration guidelines.
- Drop off between 7:30 am and 8:00 am.
- Literature indicates a decreased risk of post-surgical complications for pets who can be picked up from the hospital shortly after their procedure, compared to pets remaining in the hospital all day. Please have your phone available to answer calls the day of your pet's procedure.
